# - Objectives -

### **Rowan Core (General Education)**

- Students can communicate their understanding of sustainability in social, cultural, ecological and/or economic milieus, both locally and globally.



## - Exams-

The semester is divided into 4 quarters. Each quarter has 5 units of material. Each quarter will end with an exam on the 5 units. The final exam will cover the fourth quarter and count the same as the previous 3 earlier exams.

Exams will consist of standard questions (multiple choice, short answer, etc.) as well as 1 essay question per exam.

#### \*\*\* THERE ARE NO MAKEUPS FOR MISSED EXAMS. Period \*\*\*

However, the **lowest of your 4 exam scores will be dropped**. So if you miss an exam, it will be the score that is dropped. If you are happy with your first 3 exam scores, you still must take the final exam since it contains Rowan Core evaluation questions that are required to be completed for assessment. But if you are happy with your first three exam scores, the pressure to take the final exam is less because the lowest score is nevertheless dropped.

# - Assignments -

There are four written assignments that are to be done individually throughout the semester. These assignments focus on developing your writing and reflections skills. They are relatively short and generally ask you to reflect on how the course content is pertinent to your own life experience.

### - Discussions-

There are four web discussions, one within each quarter of the semester. You are to provide your thoughts about a particular topic that we are covering and then you are to respond to at least one of your classmate's posts.

## - Attendance -

This is a remote, synchronous course delivered by Canvas/Zoom meaning that you are require to attend by logging into the Canvas course page and the Zoom session for the class. You must be actively participating in the course during the course meeting time. Attendance will be taken once or more times during each class section by students signing in when prompted by the instructor by typing your first and last name into the chat box. Your attendance record will be one of the factors incorporated into your class participation grade.

While students will not be required to have their Zoom cameras activated, it is strongly encouraged during any discussions so that we can have an interactive learning experience for all. Zoom camera's that are active will be evidence of positive class participation (however inactive cameras will not result in penalizing your grade).

# - Policies -

### **Class Participation**

Class participation takes attendance into account and it is important that students be as cooperative

and engaged as possible with all class activities. Class participation also includes group breakout sessions during class that will result in student discussions and then summary answers to the class submitted by a representative of each group.

Students who join the live, synchronous remote class session held during regular class meeting days/times will be counted as attending the class. While it is preferred that students broadcast their own videos for participation, students may choose to connect instead through audio and written chat only, as long as they are able to view the video broadcast.
